From the Chair

Most readers of LASER are conscious of the disturbing new growth of mysticism, pseudoscience, and hostility to responsible science: Shirley MacLaine's "channeling" for example, a multimillion dollar enterprise; UFOs are coming back in vogue; and Jeremy Rifkin and his ilk continue to create havoc in bioengineering while so-called antivivisectionist advocates are destroying animal research laboratories wearing leather shoes. There still exist legitimate concerns about bioengineering and about animal use in research, but these concerns are being responsibly addressed by the scientific community. For example, at the Asilomar (California) Conference in 1975, limits were selfimposed on the scope of permissible recombinant DNA research until the risks could be exhaustively evaluated.

The fundamental unstated problem, underlying the spurious enterprises that allows for pseudoscience to flourish at our collective expense, is the low estate in our society of individuals able or willing to think for themselves. At almost any time, there are pervasive, almost all-encompassing, pressures to direct what we are to think. For example, carefully listen to and watch the evening anchored news on our national networks. Every segment is so presented with voice inflections and graphics to match, to subtly (and not so subtly) assert an opinion: The NFL is on strike (that's bad). President Reagan signs the budget bill

that's good). Gorbachev is wooing the Europeans (that's bad).

...(AIDS research offers hope (that's good). And then, for good measure, comes the commercials. There is no getting away from this intellectual dictatorship. We are almost inured to it, but for CSICOP, the SCS and other like-minded groups and individuals.

I would like to direct our readers once again to a previous LASER article entitled "Encourage Thinking Rather Than Debunking" (Vol. 3, no. 1) by SCS Executive Director Al Seckel that sets out the important goals of CSICOP in general and SCS in particular. This article deserves to be reread at least once a year. For a long time, we have been preaching to the choir, and concentrating on Uri Geller, astrology, UFOs, the Bermuda Triangle and other aberrations that are heresies to rational thinking. Al Seckel's point is very well taken: Our function should be to encourage and teach better thinking skills rather than just debunk muddled thoughts. We should not just provide pat answers, but

help guide the questioner to answer his or her own questions. We must somehow encourage the use of reason rather than the blind acceptance of authority.

We are to give substance, in this 200th Anniversary of the U.S. Constitution, to Jefferson's assertion about the victory of rational thought in an informed citizenry of our Republic. Accomplishing such a mission is likely to be a never-ending task, for us and for our progeny. But SCS is making a difference, and some significant results are already in place; Above all, the 7-2 decision of the U.S. Supreme Court declaring it to be unconstitutional to teach Creationism as science in the Louisiana public science classrooms. The recognition by such powerful organs as the Los Angeles Times and the Santa Monica News, of the public value of our mission includes regular feature columns in their respective papers. There are also financial grants and more public access in process for the SCS, and much more. We are finally breaking through to the public-at-large, where the action has got to be if we are to make a lasting impact.
