tiny bits of mass can seem a great deal like a violation of the law of conservation of energy, the first law. Physicists respond by saying that mass and energy are fundamentally the same thing. In the perpetual-motion subculture, nonetheless, "E=mc2" has become a sort of magical incantation. Today's more articulate enthusiasts describe their efforts in high-flying prose that's part Marvel Comics, and part Einstein-à-go-go: "a dynamic energy source entering our physical world through a location we call a magnet," "ions . . . stressed in a curved time and space relationship" or-Joe Newman's phrase-"a mechanical unification of the gravitational, electromagnetic, and nuclear fields."


"Many of these people are always saying they've discovered a principle that's 'outside of science,' " says physicist Al Seckel, "but they only say that because when scientists test their machines, they fail the test. They rationalize this failure away by saying that science, rather than their machine, is wrong and the device obviously must operate outside of science, right?" He snorts in indignation.

Seckel is the founder and executive director of the Southern California Skeptics, a group of scientists who investigate claims of the paranormal,

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


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from astrology and ESP to machines that run by themselves. (IPL's Al Hibbs is the group's chairman this year.) A row of books written by skeptical people stretches across one wall of Seckel's Pasadena study, just below his cuckoo clock: The Loch Ness Mystery Solved, The Truth About Uri Geller, Miracle Mongers and Their Methods, among others. He is a boyish 28-year-old who himself has a considerable flair for publicity.

"We keep running across people who claim their experiments won't work if there are negative vibes around-you know, skepticism," Seckel says. "Now, I happen to know that the laws of the Universe work even if you don't believe in them!" For a hard-core rationalist, Seckel's manner of speaking is strangely like that of a Bible-slapping evangelist. To emphasize a point, he'll lean forward in his chair and slowly shout the last few words, then pause dramatically to let them sink in.

Seckel, Hibbs and several of their colleagues were recently called in by would-be inventors to test two different perpetual-motion devices. One was an electrical generator that multiplied whatever power it took in, according to its inventors, a trio of seemingly sincere men in their 20s. "Ever see the lab equipment in one of those old Frankenstein movies?" Seckel asks. "That's what this thing looked like. It had all sorts of wires coming out of it and rows of light



Geared-up waterwheel and screw would have been powered by large metal balls.

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

"Afterwards, I said to the main investor, 'How long did you see this thing run?' "Twenty minutes.' 'What was its power source?' 'It was plugged into a wall.' 'Well, if there was really more energy out than energy in, why didn't he just plug it into itself?' He said, 'You know, I never thought of that.'" Seckel jumps to his feet and concludes from a gleeful crouch: "For \$2.5 million, I would have thought of that!"

Seckel keeps a thick file on the various perpetual-motion schemes that have made headlines in recent years, a disproportionate number of them in the Los Angeles area. One local inventor, after being acquitted of 51 counts of fraud and conspiracy two years ago for selling shares in a gravity generator, announced he was going right back into business. "I'm sure the next 12 investors in that machine will be the jurors," a police investigator was quoted as saying.

Perpetual-motion inventors themselves, in fact, often seem as gullible as their backers. The beauty of an overbalancing wheel, or a sealed box containing a 15-watt light bulb surrounded by solar collectors, or a motor that keeps itself going by boiling water with its own exhaust pipe, is its almost breathtaking simplicity. On paper, it's obvious the scheme will work. Over and over, inventors told me they had decided not to build a working model because anyone who so much as glanced at it could go home and copy it. As often as not, the inventor's chief concern is how to keep all that multiplying energy under control once the machine takes off. "I'm messing around with something no one's ever done before," a worried-sounding man in Kentucky told me one night. "There's just a chance I could set off a small nuclear explosion."

Nothing—not patent regulations, not history books and certainly not the laws of physics—discourages the hard-core perpetual-motion inventor. "Some professors are so smart, they can't figure these things out," summed up an auto mechanic in New England who's planning to market a permanent-magnet motor as soon as he finishes connecting all the parts. "It's too simple for them."
